What We Do

ISP offers spiritual retreat and reflection programs based in Ignatian spirituality and the 12-step tradition for people rebuilding their lives from homelessness and substance use addiction. Founded in the Jesuit tradition, ISP welcomes people of all faiths and backgrounds. We create safe spaces for our participants to deepen their relationship with God, bond with others in recovery, and find renewed hope and purpose for the journey ahead.

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friend of ISP,

Last year was a milestone year for ISP as we celebrated the 25th anniversary of our founding—a quarter century of walking with individuals on the journey of recovery from homelessness and addiction. Over the years, ISP has grown into a national movement offering spiritual retreats and reflection circles in 20+ cities. This small but mighty volunteer-led ministry has welcomed over 20,000 individuals since our inception, fostering healing, connection, and personal transformation. Grounded in our core values, honoring the sacredness of every story, and believing in the power and gifts of our community, we marked this anniversary by reflecting on the collective impact of our work and setting bold intentions for the future.

The centerpiece of our 25th anniversary celebration was our 2024 *Company of Grace: The Power of Sacred Stories* event on April 25. Held as a hybrid gathering, it offered many of us the joy of connecting in person in Chicago for the first time in years while extending a virtual welcome to a nationwide audience. This special evening brought together our community for storytelling, conversation, and reflection on the values that guide our work. Highlights included a thought-provoking conversation with *New York Times* columnist David Brooks, as well as moving testimonies from alumni and participants whose lives have been transformed by ISP’s programs. It was both a celebration of all we’ve accomplished and a powerful call to action in support of this vital work. Thanks to a matching gift from our Board of Directors, we raised crucial funds to sustain ISP programs, ensuring we can continue creating transformative spaces for connection, healing and growth.

Thank you for being an essential part of ISP’s story of growth and change over these last 25 years. After celebrating all we’ve achieved together, we now look to the next quarter century with hope and purpose. Together, we will continue to light the path!

Lisa Marie's Story

A Spiritual Journey of Recovery and Renewal

For most of my life, I carried the weight of addiction, pain, and responsibility. My path to sobriety has been tough but transformative. My journey began with a struggle against a Suboxone addiction that left me feeling lost and disconnected.

In 2022, I turned to Saint Francis House. It became my sanctuary, offering not just treatment but compassion and dignity. **I learned that recovery wasn't just about being clean; it was about rebuilding, rediscovering, and reconnecting with myself.**

A pivotal moment came when I attended an ISP overnight retreat. For the first time, I felt safe enough to let my guard down and talk about the burdens I'd carried for years. That experience helped me realize that spirituality was the missing piece in my recovery. **ISP gave me a sense of purpose, connection, and community. I found strength in quiet reflection and support from others.** Now, sharing my story and spreading the word about ISP feels incredible.

Today, I'm 2 ½ years sober. Recovery is not a straight path but one full of twists, setbacks, and moments of grace. I'm no longer just surviving—I'm living, learning, and growing! For those who feel lost, know that the journey is possible and can be beautiful. ISP has shown me that there's more to life than surviving. There's **joy, growth, and true freedom.** And while the road ahead is uncertain, I know I'm not walking it alone.

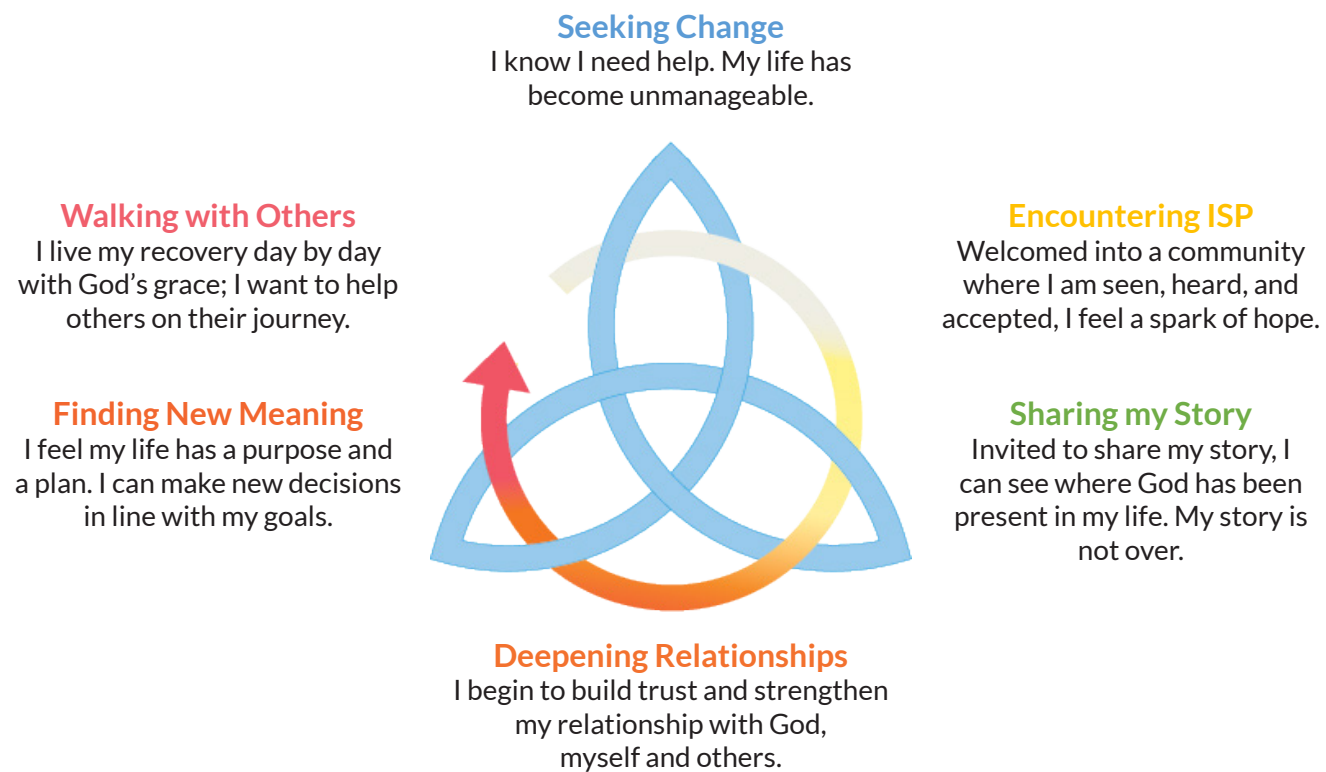

Healing happens in relationship.

ISP believes that transformation begins from the inside out—when individuals are invited into caring communities where they can strengthen their walk with God, build new relationships, and forge a deeper connection with themselves. Our *Theory of Change* is grounded in this vision, symbolized by intertwining cords that represent the love, companionship, and transformational support so essential to the journey of recovery—elements often overlooked in traditional approaches to homelessness and addiction.

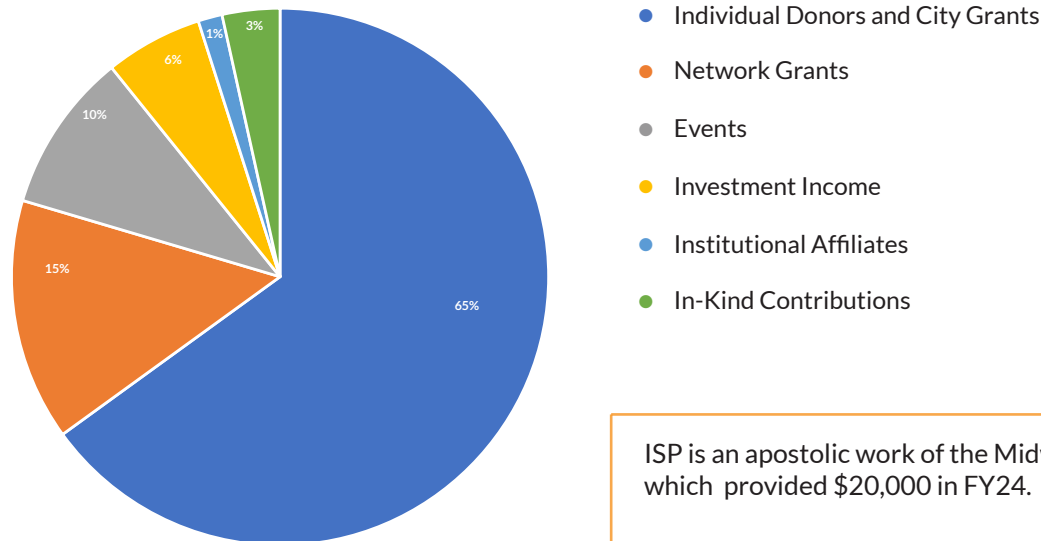

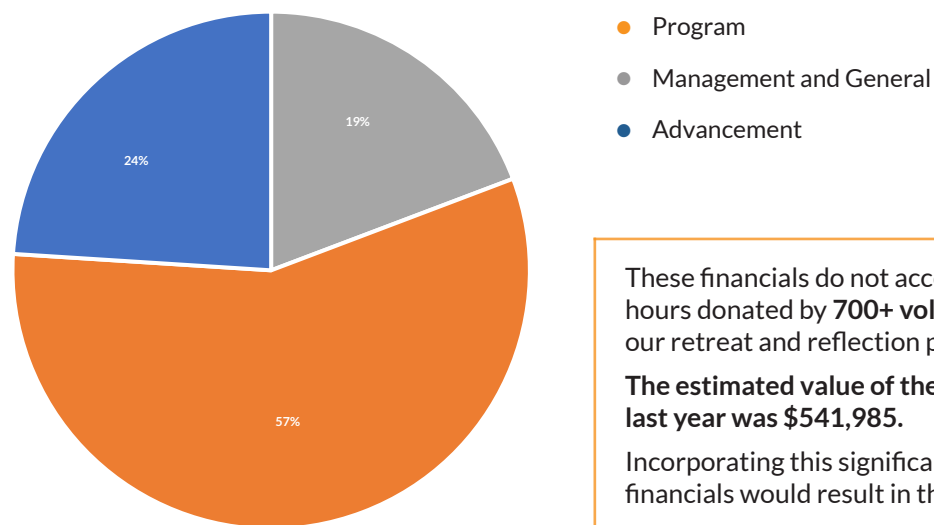
ISP is in the fourth year of our 5-year effort to increase program capacity and impact. The FY24 revenue surplus is due in part to multi-year pledge commitments.

Revenue: \$1,406,827



ISP is an apostolic work of the Midwest Jesuits which provided \$20,000 in FY24.

Expenses: \$1,242,359



These financials do not account for the in-kind hours donated by **700+ volunteers** who make our retreat and reflection programs possible.

The estimated value of these volunteer hours last year was \$541,985.

Incorporating this significant investment into our financials would result in the following:

- Program – 70%
- Management and General – 13%
- Advancement – 17%

In honor of our 25th anniversary, ISP leadership, alumni and community stakeholders worked together to develop organizational core values that will guide our ministry into the future.

The Impact is Profound

Deacon Mark Danis, Director of Spirituality at the St. Vincent de Paul Society in Dayton, OH, shares how ISP programs have transformed the clients he serves.



The Ignatian Spirituality Project (ISP) has been a steady presence for several years at St. Vincent de Paul Society in Dayton. ISP spiritual reflections create a space for participants to share their trials and triumphs, fostering **connection and healing**.

The women and facilitators support one another in heartfelt prayer for their journeys. Creative projects, such as coloring, crafting, and making gift baskets provide a tactile outlet for reflection and joy. Especially during Christmas, these gatherings take on deeper meaning as the women create artistic depictions of the holiday's sacred scenes, affirming the divine presence that calls each of us by name.

The impact is profound. With an average of 25 attendees, **ISP provides a practical yet spiritual foundation**. Many women who attend the spiritual reflections have gone on to attend an ISP overnight retreat, where they encountered God not only through

the retreat, but through the compassionate presence of the ISP facilitators—individuals who listened, cared, and **met them where they were**.

At St. Vincent's, the women feel safe enough to share their deeply personal stories—something they rarely do elsewhere. **ISP offers more than ministry; it offers peace, hope, and a place to be truly seen.**
